




Dojocho Conducting Memorial Service. Left: Interior of the Aiki Shrine.




## Ichihashi Shihan Entourage Visit Our Dojo May 19-21st.











Recently our Dojo was damaged by water from a broken pipe. It would have been a minor problem but our landlord had hired an inexperienced plumber to do some repairs and he increased the water pressure without realizing how badly in repair the building plumbing was. Because the turn-off valve was corroded, there was no way to turn off the valve and water keep pouring out flooding the entire Dojo. ## Sensei's Message:

## Two Arrows In Flight

First of all, I would like to thank all my students for their kind thoughts and wonderful Birthday present. Also, several of my senior students took me for nice Birthday dinners and I really appreciate it. As my 50th, this year is kind of special to me.

Secondly, I would like to express my gratitude to my students who have donated so generously and helped so much to get the new tatami in the Dojo. But, this is only a loan, and as we negotitate to be reimbursed for all of our damages to the Dojo, each donation will be returned. Although this may take a while, replacement of the new tatami will not.

Finally, I am happy many students were able to donate their time to take care of our guests from the Omiya Dojo. David Ito and Mike Dotzenrod helped greatly driving them around Los Angeles. James Doi, Cheryl Lew and Curtis Westfall helped to entertain them as well as several other students. It was a big job. As students take more and more involvement in taking care of our honored guests, they should become more and more aware of even the finest details in protocol. I believe this is a very important and necessary part of one's training that only a few can have the priviledge to experience if they are willing to donate their time and energies on these occasions. Actually, the role of the "guest" and "host" is an extremely important and all-pervading element in Japanese culture and there are many traditions and rules which dictate the etiquette and conduct for each individual occasion. The theme of "guest" and "host" is the main element in the traditional tea ceremony, this topic is even discussed in Zen "koan" in which one works towards his own spiritual enlightenment. The role of the guest and host is so important that it has even influenced and controlled the formation of the Japanese language and, to a large degree, the Japanese psyche. I hope students will study this very well.

In Zen, it is said that learning is like two arrows in flight trying to make contact in the air. Almost impossible, I imagine. As important as ability and comittment to one's goals are, attitude is very important. Whereas one can succeed in anything if he strives and puts everything he has into it, attitude is generally where almost everyone fails. In Aikido, in Zen, in all of our traditional practices, it is our attitude and mental state for which we must constantly be on guard. If you realize this for yourself, half the battle is won.

The late Bishop Yamashita used to tell me, "If they don't understand, they will never be able to 'understand' it." This always puzzled me. I always thought, "How are they going to understand it, if they don't learn it, if no one bothers to teach it?"

Although I still don't fully understand this and it has in some

ways become my "koan." In some respects, I believe my teacher meant that if one does not realize his own mistakes and shortcomings, he will never be able to correct them. At the same time, I think it also means that if one doesn't "want" to understand, he will never understand it. Maybe these are two sides of the same coin.

In most circumstances, we do what we think is right, not what we know is right because human beings are guided by, more than anything else, his ego. In Aikido, we try not to use our ego. This is very difficult. In the tea ceremony, the host considers the comfort and enjoyment of the guest. At the same time, the guest tries to show his appreciation of the efforts of the host. This creates a wonderful harmony of contrasts. As an example, in summer tea, the brazier is placed farthest away from the guest. In winter, the warming brazier is placed closest to the guest. In every respect, we must consider the particular circumstances and act in harmony with them.

Once, a samurai who was an avid devotee of tea asked a fellow samurai to be invited for tea with the intention of inspecting his friends treasured tea utensils. "Please invite me for tea and show me your treasures, "he begged. His friend agreed. On the next day, when he visited his friend's residence he was shocked to see the room filled with swords, armour, weapons of every sort.

"What is this?" he asked in disappointment, "I came to see your tea bowls!" His friend explained, "You requested to see my 'treasures' and as a warrior, these weapons are what I value most in life!" Really, it is like two arrows meeting each other flight!

Everyone should make friends with our guests from afar, as you know, so many come to our Dojo nowadays. Please keep, in the back of your mind, that, in creating personal friendships with our visitors, we are also supporting our Dojo and, hopefully, creating a better Aikido world.

Please enjoy our new tatami but please take care of them as well. They must last a lifetime.

These are very busy, tough days for the Dojo. I need everyone's loyalty and committment now to carry us through into better coming in the future.

## Tatami De' Feet:

Our new tatami seem to scuff by everyone's rough feet very easily so please, please, please, somehow, someway, take care in your practice. Let's take good care of our tatami and enjoy them for a very long time. We don't need our tatami to suffer from de' feet (defeat). Thanks for your cooperation and understanding in this matter.


## Book: The Sword Polisher's Record-The Way of Kung Fu
