

Kobe Earthquake Relief Work: A Voluntary Volunteer

As everyone knows, on January 17th, there was a devastaing earthquake which almost completely destroyed the city of Kobe. Over 5,400 lives were lost and 250,000 people were left homeless. It is strange that it happened on the very same day we had our earthquake exactly one year earlier. I think that all of us in Los Angeles were rather anticipating an earthquake here and, when it happened in Kobe, some of us (all of us, perhaps) gave a quiet sigh of relief while registering on our faces shock and horror at the totality of the destruction.

The first reports were confused and contradictory. Obviously, everyone was in shock and certainly no one knew what to do really. Reports said that the government moved too slowly and too inefficiently. At first Japan didn't need help. Then, they needed help. At first, they only requested financial aid and it was soon known that they needed supplies and the basic necessities of clothing and food. Misery and suffering caused by the earthquake was further aggravated by a rainy season causing a near epidemic flu outbreak, immediately followed by the bitter freezing cold of an untimely snow.

The Consulate of Japan requested the JACCC to act as a major collection point for donations of clothing and other materials. Mr. Miles Hamada was put in charge of operations. Concerned about the people in Kobe, anxious to help out my good friend, Miles, and finally in some way to fulfill the vows of my priesthood, I decided to volunteer. It is something I have never really done before in this type of situation although I have given it considerable thought at other times. Without giving it much more thought than that, I went down to the JACCC to offer my assistance whatever that might be. Seeing Miles sitting there all by himself, I offered my greetings to which Miles' response was, "Are you here to talk or to work?" Trying not to pay too much attention to this clever way he hooked me into the job, I got down to work. The process itself was simple. We receive the goods and request that they fill out a donation form. The good are then brought into the main work room - the North Gallery - where they are inspected and sorted. When


sorting box becomes full. The goods are removed, tallied, refolded and packed. The next step is to seal the box and add the label. Next, the contents and numbers are recorded on the box and in the computer to create a shipping manifest for customs. Finally, the boxes are stacked in numerical order and await the Nippon Express truck to pick them up. They were shipped to Japan by Japan Airlines and All Japan Airlines, free of charge. by the end of this three week challenge about 4,000 boxes of good were processed. It was a lot of work but a feel-good job. It was a great learning process as well.

Remembering the Founder:

Quite some time ago my father returned from one of his many conventions and business meetings and asked me such a srtange question under such odd circumstances that I have never forgot this episode. With a rather puzzled expression, he asked, "You have always told me how great your Aikido teacher is, but are you sure about this? You are sure he is so well known? (My father never approved of me practicing Aikido and never really knew much about my obsession) "Why?" I asked thinking that this is such a ridiculous question.

"I just attended a big convention and happened to sit next to someone who said that he too is an Aikido teacher with over 15 years experience with the rank of 3rd Dan. He knew who you were (myself) but he never heard of Morihei Ueshiba or Kisshomaru Ueshiba when I mentioned their names."

I could only reply: "He is no Aikidoist whatever he says. If he is, he doesn't belong in Aikido." Actually my language was quite a bit stronger than this, highly unprintable, and definitely not fit for our Newsletter or the tender ears of young children and ladies.

As a young Aikidoist, we understood and fully appreciated how Aikido and the Founder were one and the same thing which was and is totally unseparable. It is 27 yeears since his passing so it is appreciated that, for a majority of Aikidoists today, O-Sensei is only a distant and vague image. Yet all Aikidoists, especially teachers, owe O-Sensei a great deal and have the responsibility to keep his memory alive. Indeed the ultimate focus of our training is to finally understand his Teachings. Today, many lack this sense of gratitude to the Founder and it is a very sad thing. I know that many dojos do not even have his picture placed in a position of honor in their practice area. Few even know his name or who he is!

Today, O-Sensei is not only remembered in the mainstream Aikido community but he has become an inspiration for all martial arts disciplines. He is the subject of intense discussion and study among religious leaders, philsophers, writers, poets, and many of the top thinkers today in Japan and in many parts of the world. Our Dojo keeps O-Sensei's memory alive and well. Thank God! I hope everyone will appreciate this and thank O-Sensei each time we practice. Indeed, O-Sensei's practice uniform is enshrined in our Dojo so we can say his actual spirit is here with us as well.

Remembering the Founder con't.

April 26, 1995 is the 27th anniversary of O'Sensei's Passing and our Dojo observes this day as one of the most important events of the year. Everyone is urged to come.

This year, our arrangements are very simple. We will have practice from 6:15pm-7:154pm as usual. A priest of the Zenshuji Temple will conduct a Memorial Service for O-Sensei from 7:30pm-8:00pm. At this time, during the reading of the sutras, each person will offer incense. From 8:30pm we will have a reception at a local restaurant and enjoy each other's company.

Offering incense or "o-shoko" is a way of paying one's respects. Put your hand together and bow once. Take a small pinch of incense (looks like sawdust) and place it on the charcoal in the incense burner. Put your hands together and bow again. It is very simple.

The reading of the sutras is beautiful and the fragrance of the incense is very spiritually calming. The incense is the same as that used in the Zen monastery during meditation. I believe everyone will enjoy and receive great spiritual strength from this ceremony honoring the Founder. Everyone is invited. You may bring your friends and family as well.

Please do not forget O'Sensei great contribution of Aikido. Thank you.

Recently, a student attended practice at another school and many rude and disrespectful things were said about the Founder of Aikido. It is not necessary to do anything in this circumstance but one must deeply question the motives and qualifications of the instructor who would do such a thing. Oddly, this student was rather taken in by all his talk and joined his school. I am very shamed that such a person was my student, and cannot believe that I could raise someone who had no appreciation or respect for O'Sensei. Also, that it happens so close to O'Sensei's memorial day causes me to think more seriously about how we educate and encourage our students in training.

To respect yourself, you must learn to respect others. Without respect for Nature, we are not long for this world. There is an ancient saying that "all martial arts begins and ends with respect."


