



Kajyo Suzuki Sensei



Sensei's Message:

Principles In Practice

This is the year I want to take it a little easy, improve my health and finish my book. Although we had no special projects for 2000, by New Year's Eve, we are already enjoying a very, very busy schedule. I know I always promise my students that we will cut back and do a little less each year; I am always caught in this trap and must apologize that although this year is too busy again, "next year" will be a little easier.

Our main project for the year is Kajyo Suzuki Sensei's Sword Lecture on March 26th. This is a very important project for our Dojo - to introduce artists and experts to the community and to enhance community growth. At the same time, this is our first major project with the Consulate General of Japan and I hope

the first of many more projects to come. This month, we have been interviewed by UPN and Fox Sports International. Last Year, A&E and the History Channel. I hope this helps to make the public more aware of Aikido. Indeed, a very busy year already!

As much as we preserve our precious traditions and heritage through Aikido, there is also a natural process of change with the progress of time. We work to understand that both processes are the same operation of Nature. Many new students are coming into the Dojo. We must be more understanding and more aware of their needs. Yet, introduce them to

what is the very best Aikido practice can offer to them. This becomes another dimension to the prupose of our practice and the direction we take it.

We have a new generation of aspiring instructors developing. Teaching is a great, often burdensome, responsibility. It is not because we are "senior" or "stronger" or "better." There are specific qualifications that make a teacher a teacher - much of it involves personal self-understanding. Some become teachers early, some later. Some need an early start some later. The timing is more "natural" than deliberate. This means a teacher becomes a teacher when students begin to recognize a person as a teacher. More often than not, we cannot decide this for ourselves.

However, there are several hints to becoming a good teacher. First, become a good student.


Second, master Aikido to the best of your ability. We can't but we must try. It is the reality of teaching. Thirdly, we must begin to understand how the principles of Aikido actually and profoundly effect everything in our lives.

When we are young, it is natural to depend more on our physical strength and ability. We have youth and confidence in that youth. This makes us strong in many ways. As we grow older however, we find we cannot rely on that youthful strength any longer. We also gain a greater "awareness" or "acceptance" (what to call it?) of the world. Aikido principles are very profound and we have only scratched its surface. We must continue to practice Aikido and furthrumore continue to practice "Aikido principles in practice." Keep up the good work!






