Hatsu-Bon Service for Furuya Sensei

The months of July and August are always very busy and happy times in Little Tokyo. This is the time when the Japanese-American community has their Obon festivals and Nisei Week. I still remember as a very young child going to Obon festival and winning a goldfish at one of the carnival booths. I even remember taking it home and watching my father placing the goldfish into a large bowl. I also remember that particular goldfish did not live to long! In high school and college, Obon was the place to hang out with friends, meet girls or take a date. For our

During Obon on each day, Hatsu Bon, a first-year memorial service is performed for the family of those who lost a loved one during the past year. It was an opportunity for dojo members to offer incense in the memory of Kensho Furuya Sensei. The service was

In this allegory, Mokuren's mother was suffering from hunger. All food would burn before she could consume it. Mokuren asked the Buddha for advise to help his mother and the Buddha told Mokuren to offer lots of food to monks and lay people in order to save his mother. According to Dr. Kato, the essence of Obon is extending compassion to all beings selflessly.

July was also the month of our last practice and rank examinations in the dojo. To honour the dojo that Sensei built, we also had a farewell dojo party.

We also started Japanese classes on July

21st. What started as an idea for a few of us to get together to start learning conversational Japanese turned into an actual class with a Japanese sensei. We have a total of thirteen students learning Japanese from Keiko Takenaka Sensei. Surprisingly, we have several parents, girlfriends and other non-dojo members in the class. The demand to learn Japanese at the Dojo has been a very pleasant surprise. We welcome Takenaka Sensei as the first class left the students eager to study more Japanese.
